Day Trippin' with Nu

As Nu members contributed directions for a great day trip, the first road suggested was the electronic super-highway. The website **Only in Illinois** will send you a daily newsletter with hundreds of great places to visit in Illinois. (go to <u>www.onlyinourstate.com</u> and choose your state via the drop-down listing or click on SUBSCRIBE, and then click on Illinois or any other state; you can sign up for multiple states.



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Two day-trip destinations were recommended by more than one member. Woody's Diner in LeRoy (east on I-74) was the first. From Woody's you can continue east (I-57, I-80, I-94 and US 12) to the SW corner of Michigan where you'll find fields of blueberries to pick yourself or to purchase at farm stands. Heading south (US 31 or I-69) you'll also find lots of U-Pick fruits and veggies on the backroad farms south of Indianapolis in the direction of Louisville (I-65). Throughout Indiana you'll discover many good museums including the one at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

The second doubly-recommended sites were Lock and Dam #14 on the Mississippi River at LeClaire, Iowa (I-80 and US67) and #18 at Gladstone, Illinois (US 34 and III. 164). There you will find hundreds of eagles in the winter and hundreds of pelicans in June. If you like nature, you'd also like to see the sunflowers in July at the Jubilee College State Park (off Thousand Mile Road, past the Jubilee entrance, to all the way down to a large field on the left) and the water lilies and swans of Spring Lake (south of Pekin on Illinois 29.)

The roads of importance in Knoxville and Galesburg (west on I-74) are the railroads. Knoxville and Galesburg offer many sites worthy of a visit, a meal or an overnight stay including the Railroad and the Underground Railroad museums. The restored Shell station in Knoxville, the Carl Sandburg home, historic churches, the Orpheum theater, Knox College, Old Main (site of a Lincoln-Douglas debate), and an antique mall on Seminary Street are all interesting. The Big Catz BBQ, the Packinghouse, and the Landmark Café and Creperie are recommended restaurants. If your day-trip lasts more than a day, you can spend the night at the Galesburg East Campground in Knoxville.

Following the Great River Road south of St. Louis you can explore the historic French settlements of the 18th century. First stop is Fort de Chartres, built in 1720, which has lots of history – military, French, Native American, American - and lots of space to run around (children) and explore. Prairie du Rocher is a small French village considered to be the center of this region that is hoping to become a National Park.

Further south on the Great River Road you can visit the Rock Shelter at Modoc where Illinois's first inhabitants took shelter 9,000 years ago, the elegant Pierre Menard house (built in 1800 in Ellis Grove), Chester, the home of Pop-eye and the horseradish capital of the world, and Kaskaskia, Illinois' first capital. You can cross the Mississippi by bridge at Chester or by ferry at Modoc and spend the rest of the day in Sainte Genevieve, MO. with its French architecture, antique shops, parks, wineries, and waterpark.

Another day-trip in Illinois will take you down the "Mother Road", historic Route 66, to Litchfield. Vic Shilings Gas Station is now the Welcome Center for Route 66 where you'll find directions to the Jubelt's Bakery, the Litchfield Pickers' Market (second Sunday of the month), the Ariston Café (oldest café on Route 66) and the Skyview Drive In. Get your kicks on Route 66.

The final trip follows the most ancient path – the Illinois River. The Spirit of Peoria will take you through the locks and up to Starved Rock State Park where you can hike, view the waterfalls, see the eagles, visit the Lock and Dam headquarters and have dinner and an overnight in the historic lodge.

Whether you travel the interstate, the backroad, the Mother Road, the Railroad, the Great River Road or the River, you'll find lots to see and do when you go "day-trippin' – yeh."

Donation Possibilities

As you probably know by now, we have not made plans for donations for the near future because of complications caused by COVID. We do also know that there still families in need, and in growing number. Here are just a few places in Peoria that run food pantries that could use donated goods in case you would like to donate on your own. It would be practical to call them first, though, to make sure they are open and accepting donations, since things can change in this COVID world.

Some commonly needed items for pantries are: canned meat or fish, soup, canned fruits and vegetables, peanut butter, pasta, rice, cereal, tuna in pouches, laundry products, toiletries. Keep in mind that some individuals don't have facilities for cooking, so plan accordingly.

If dropping off food is not practical for you, consider giving a monetary donation to any of the above or to one of the area food banks. The food banks distribute food widely to pantries and other organizations and programs that serve people in need. You can mail a donation or donate online.
